Service Learning at Valencia

<u>Service Learning</u> creates opportunities for students to develop skills that relate to course content while partnering with the community and promoting civic engagement.

Many education courses at Valencia include service learning hours, which requires students to engage in field experience in the classroom. Consider the time commitment for service learning when registering for classes.

- EDF 2005-Introduction to the Teaching Profession
- EDF 2085-Introduction to Diversity for Educators
- EDG 2940-Experiential Learning in Education (field experience optional)
- EDG 2941-Internship Exploration in Education (educational internships optional)

You can also earn recognition for your participation in these courses. There are three ways to be recognized at the college:

- Service Learning lapel pin: students enrolled in a service learning course receives a lapel pin when they participate in the course
- Transcript coding: service learning experience is included in the student's transcript
- Service Learning medallion: students that complete a minimum of 40 service hours earn a medallion to wear at graduation
 - o Bronze (40-55 service hours)
 - o Silver (60-75 service hours)
 - o Gold (80-95 service hours)
 - o Gold Plus (100 or more service hours)

General Knowledge Test (GKT)

In order to be admitted into an education program, you must pass all four sections of the General Knowledge Test. Review the <u>Florida Teacher</u> <u>Certification Examinations (FTCE) frequently asked questions</u> for more information.

GKT subjects include the following:

- Essay subtest: 1 Essay- 50 Minutes
- Mathematics subtest: 40 questions 1 hour and 40 minutes
- English language subtest: 40 questions 40 minutes
- Reading subtest: 40 questions 55 minutes

Questions to Ask Your Student Success Coach

What's the difference between dropping a class and withdrawing from a class, and how does this impact me?

How Do I Run My Degree Audit?

The degree audit is a great tool to help you plan out your courses. It is a summary or audit of your degree. It will show you the classes that you have completed and the ones you have yet to complete. Here are the steps on running a degree audit. We encourage you to consult with your Student Success Coach.

- 1. Log in to Student Portal.
- 2. Click on Students on the left hand side.
- 3. Look for the Path to Graduation box and click on My Academic Progress (Degree Audit).
- 4. Click on Generate New Degree Audit.
- 5. Select the term you are currently in, click submit.
- 6. Click on the button next to the name of your degree.
- 7. Click on Generate Request.
